

Happy Holidays NWC members,

I hope your holidays have been going well. While the 117th Congress officially ends on Jan. 3, 2023, essentially, they completed all of their legislative business before the Christmas holiday. This includes the passage of a compromised Water Resources Development Act package and FY2023 appropriations (more below), both of which were promptly signed into law. Congress will be back to open the 118th Congress on Jan. 3, 2023.

Additionally, and probably the biggest news, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers unveiled their final "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States' rule which will be implemented 60 days after its publication in the Federal Register. How this final rule will fare, compared to the previous Obama and Trump rules, is anyone's guess. And an added complication: the Supreme Court has yet to rule in Sackett v. EPA, a related case, they heard this fall...(to see more)
